PATHWAYS FOR PROGRESSION

There are many qualifications that can help you progress your career in the Conveyancing sector. The pathways below are examples of the routes you may choose to take.

Full-time education example

Step 1

A-levels – it is not a requirement to have studied law at A-level

Step 2

Law degree – a degree is not essential but can be an advantage. However, to become a licensed conveyancer, you will still need to pass the Council for Licensed Conveyancers qualifications



Commercial example

Step 1

Level 4 Conveyancing Technician diploma via MOL – commercial basis

Step 2

Level 6 Licensed Conveyancer diploma via MOL – commercial basis



To access a law degree following A-levels, you will need at least two but usually three A-levels, with entry requirements ranging from BCC to AAA. In addition, five GCSEs are required, including maths, science and English.



JOB ROLES AND CAREER PROGRESSION OPPORTUNITIES

Working in conveyancing offers rapid career progression opportunities, from secretarial and support positions to fully qualified solicitors and licensed conveyancing – a great career for you if you enjoy being busy, working at pace and interacting with and supporting clients.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT USING TRANSFERABLE SKILLS

It is important to be able to recognise the skills and behaviours you are gaining at any level, as you will then be able to promote these to current and potential employers, as well as education providers.

People may change career path at any point and the skills and knowledge gained can often be transferred to another role. Communication skills, decision-making skills and interpersonal skills would be valued in any career.

Other examples of careers where some of these skills could be used include mentoring, team leading, finance, estate agency and other areas of law.



MATHS AND ENGLISH

These skills will be the foundation of a long and successful career, whichever vocation you choose in the future. Most jobs need people who can read and act on information confidently and communicate effectively with others (whether verbally or in writing). They also require some knowledge of maths for problem solving, whether that's in relation to money, estimating amounts, ordering or time management.
